

Matthias keeps cool to win Delaware Open

Jim Matthias took the early lead and for the next two days withstood the pressures of being the frontrunner to win the Delaware Open golf

It was not an easy victory for the 33-year-old DuPont Country Club assistant professional, who finished the 54-hole competition Wednesday with

a 7-over-par 220 and a two-stroke lead over amateurs Bucky Erhardt and Todd Anderson. If Matthias had been younger, however, he probably wouldn't have won the tournament at all. But he kept his cool and survived all chal-lenges on Wilmington Country Club's South Course, including those of Erhardt and Anderson, both playing on their home course, and of Jeff Stoneberger, a 23-year-old amateur from Cava-

liters C.C.

"I had a terrible temper, even when I turned pro in 1977," said Matthias after capping his first major victory with a 75. "Six years ago those two three-putts on the front side today would have killed me; it would have probably been the end of my round."

Matthias was referring to two of his three bogeys on the front nine, which left him in a tie

bogeys on the front nine, which left him in a tie with Anderson and within shooting range of Erhardt and Stoneberger.

But Matthias showed no anger, only an outward air of calm on the closing nine, where he shot a 1-over-par 37. Matthias opened the back side with a birdle, then after back-to-back bogeys, he parred the final six holes.

"I wasn't worried about the others," said Matthias, who took the lead for good when Anderson bogeved ahead of him on the 14th

Anderson bogeyed ahead of him on the 14th hole. "I was worried about myself because for me I was having a poor putting round, and that is usually the strong part of my game."

Matthias had three three-putt greens overall,

the last coming from a long distance on the 12th green. But after all three, he maintained his

"My temper used to cost me strokes, but I think playing with professionals in their tournaments on a regular basis showed me how to be suc-cessful out there." he said, nodding back at the golf course. "I found that you have to keep your

goir course. Touling that you have to keep your peace of mind and just keep trying no matter how bad you're hitting the golf ball." While Matthias was keeping his composure coming home, his challengers were doing their part to help make him a champion. Anderson, who shot a 1-under-par 34 on the front side to vault into contention, fell back out for good with

bogeys on the 14th and 15th holes. Erhardt moved into contention with par golf, but he couldn't get the birdie or two he needed down the stretch. The 43-year-old Wilmington-area businessman missed two six-foot putts on 14 and 16, then fell out of contention for good with a

"I putted super except on the final six holes," groused Erhardt, who missed an 18-inch par putt on 17 en route to a 72, still the low round of the

Stoneberger hung near the lead on the front nine and made a move on the opening three holes

nine and made a move on the opening three holes of the back side, but the 23-year-old ironworker played the final six holes in 2-over-par.

For Matthias, the victory couldn't have been any more gratifying.

"I wanted to win the Open and I wanted to win it here because I think it's such a good test of golf," said Matthias, who had not played in the 54-hole event since 1977. "I love playing this golf course when it's tough. I wish I could do a little better; maybe some day I will."

But then no one came close to overwhelming
